Diploma of Rural Generalist Anaesthesia (DRGA)

Eligibility

- Be enrolled in general practice training with RACGP or ACRRM and have completed at least one year
 of GP fellowship training OR have completed fellowship with RACGP or ACRRM.
 - In consultation with your Rural Generalist Training Advisor, consider early sign up to your preferred college:
 - 1. ACRRM
 - 2. RACGP
 - If RACGP, you will need to sign up for RACGP-RG
- Have obtained a position approved for rural generalist anaesthesia training; and
- Have completed an accredited Advanced Life Support 2 (ALS-2) course within 52 calendar weeks prior to commencing DRGA.

Recommended Pre-Learning

Experience in rural generalist practice.

 - experience in rural hospitals/GPs as a rural medical student
 - Resident/Registrar years
 - experience via rural rotations into RG practices/hospitals such as:
 - John Flynn Prevocational Doctor Program (JFPDP) | Australian Government Department of Health and Aged Care. The QRGP is involved in JFPDP, contact the team for more information.

- Knowledge and skills in the management of critically ill patients, which may include:
 - o 10 weeks FTE clinical experience in intensive care medicine; or
 - 10 weeks FTE clinical experience in Emergency medicine and completion of a course which covers essential and fundamental aspects of Intensive Care; or
 - A combination of clinical experience and education which demonstrates achievement of intensive care medicine learning.

 - Emergency +/- ICU +/- Anaesthetics
 - Encourage rotation in resident years
 - Courses
 - Covering essential/fundamental aspects of Intensive Care
